

FIVE TONS OF PLASTIC

The recent Master Recycler plastic roundups were a great success. Over 500 Metro residents brought 10,000 pounds of plastic to four different sites. Many items were snapped up for reuse including nursery pots, CD holders, and over 100 buckets that will be used to collect recyclables in schools. The rest of the “would-be waste” was picked up by Agri-Plas to be recycled at their facility in Brooks.

MR volunteers processed prodigious plastic piles and promoted waste reduction. Site coordinators Robert Welch, Pat Pullen-Jones, Katy Daily, Billie Shults, and Cynthia Parker made sure everything ran smoothly from start to finish. It was Cynthia who got it started with the first plastic roundup back in January and she was featured in an *Oregonian* story that publicized the recent events.

Nursery Pot Reuse and Recycling at Farmers' Market

Help design a program to encourage vendors at the Oregon City Farmers' Market to take back nursery pots for reuse. This project will include designing signs or handouts to educate the public as to which pots the vendors will accept and to let them know that their broken or otherwise unwanted pots can be recycled at the nearby Fred Meyer store. This could also expand to the Milwaukie, Lake Oswego, and West Linn markets. Housing Authority of Portland Tenant Presentations

As of July 1, Portland's apartment complexes adopted a two-sort recycling system—glass in one cart and all other recyclables in another. The change will standardize the process citywide to make it easier for haulers (whose trucks already are converted to two-sort) and tenants, who will be able to keep just two bags in their apartments. The City of Portland Office of Sustainable Development has partnered with the Housing Authority of Portland (HAP) to bring many of the city's low-income residents a customized recycling education. HAP has 20 tenant meetings to be scheduled throughout the months of August and September. They have asked that a Master Recycler be present at each meeting to give an explanation of the new two-sort system and assist at a question and answer period. The presentation will run about 15-25 minutes, depending on the number of tenant questions. You'll receive a packet of preparation materials that will give you all the information you need.
